

Manufactured beliefs lead to something called manufactured outrage, which is on the rise every day. Things that would normally not elicit any negative reaction from an individual suddenly start to make people extremely angry, and possibly because of certain new layers of influenced beliefs. Deconstructing one's mindset and adding values is not a bad thing at its core, but when we lose our beliefs to align with that of the

> majority, we may lose sight of the truth. The Indian philosopher, orator, and writer, Jiddu Krishnamurti, has often argued in his work and speeches that conforming to norms hinders our search of the truth. That is exactly what we do on social media; conform and blend so much that we lose our individuality and what may very well be our truth. Who are we if we don't strengthen what we actually believe in?

06 BEHIND THE SCENES

THE MUSICAL CALL -in talks with Ram Sampath

A tête-à-tête with Bollywood composer, music producer and musician Mr. Ram Sampath of *Raees, Talaash* and *Delhi Belly* fame. Here is an excerpt from the interview. You can read the entire interview on the **Skyline blog page**.

Q. How and when did you realize that music was your calling?

I was always intrigued by the structure of songs. It had been an obsession of mine since I was a child. My first toy was a LP player, so before I learnt to talk I learnt how to change LPs. I started writing songs when I was about 10 years old and it was very clear from that time that this is what I wanted to do for the rest of my life. By the age of 12, I was figuring out to be a professional musician and I was already working with bands and had started performing for a live audience.

Q. From Delhi Belly to Coke Studio, you've shown versatility like none other. Did you plan for this to happen or did you go ahead with the flow?

That is an interesting question (laughs). I'd like to accredit my parents for my appreciation of music genres. My dad was a big fan of The Beatles, Jimmy Hendricks, and Elvis Presley among others while my mother, on the other hand, listened to Hindustani classical. Due to this, I got to appreciate a variety of genres of music. People see the differences in genres; I see what makes genres similar to each other. For me, a folk song by Kumar Gandharva is as moving as Radiohead.

Q. Who has inspired you?

The music industry houses many inspiring people that not only work on the front but also behind the scenes, so it is tough to single out a person. My most important teacher has been Rajat Dholakia, affectionately called as Jhukku. He is a well-known name in the advertising industry. He was the person who told me to go into the world of music and sound, and so far, he has been a massive influence on my life.

Q. Do you have any dream project? If yes, then what is it?

I am currently working on a project which is about connecting Indian talent from different genres. It is a project that is very close to my heart and you will hear about it soon.


