### National Register of Citizens (NRC)

Five years, four deferred deadlines and Rs.1,220 crores have finally led to the final conclusion in the form of around 19 lakh people being excluded from the National Register of Citizens. Communal tension in Assam has led to the deployment of extra paramilitary forces and the evocation of Section 144 in some sensitive areas. The NRC was last updated in 1951 but ever since, the Bangladesh Liberation War and the resulting refugee crisis has led to demographic changes in Assam. The Assam Accord of August 15, 1985 gave March 24, 1971 as the criteria for identifying foreigners. Those who entered Assam after March 24, 1971 were to be deported back but over the years, no government took a concrete step towards this issue. It was only after the Supreme Court orders, that the process was started in 2014.

Now that the list has been finally published, those who are excluded can approach the Foreign Tribunals. There are already 100 Foreign Tribunals and an additional 200 of them are going to be operational from September 1, 2019. Cases should be registered within 120 days i.e. till December 31, 2019 and they

would be disposed within 6 months. If not satisfied with the decision of the Foreign Tribunals then the petitioner can move to the High Court and Supreme Court.

Today when the list has been declared, those excluded, are on the verge of being stripped of their citizenship. Suspicious about the next governmental move, they have become homeless or in a larger sense 'stateless'. Most of these people lead a meek life and are more or less dependent on the government for their daily livelihood. The people, categorized as foreigners, could be debarred of their existing voting rights which will, in a way make them a less affluent stakeholder in Assam politics.

So now the question arises whether these people would be deported back to Bangladesh or would they be held in detention camps. Further, if the foreigners are not deported back to Bangladesh, then would they be divided equitably in all the states? If not then it could possibly give birth to AASU agitation 2.0, which will definitely be more intense than the earlier one.

### A State in Distress: Jammu and Kashmir

The nation bore witness to the historic decision of scrapping Article 370 and 35A of the Indian Constitution on August 05, 2019. There have been mixed reactions to the decision. While some rejoice, there are others who oppose it saying that the people of Kashmir should be the ones deciding the same. The former Chief Minister of Kashmir, Mehbooba Mufti, placed under house-arrest, expressed her views as she tweeted,

"The overwhelming mandate that PM Modi had given us hope that like a statesman he too would tread the path taken by Vajpayee Ji & reach out to people of J&K. What an utter betrayal of trust."

For those still unaware about Article 370 & 35 A: Article 370 granted an autonomous status to the states of Jammu and Kashmir. Before the scrapping of Article 370, the provisions of the Indian constitution did not apply to Jammu and Kashmir. Thus, Kashmir had its own flag, its constitution and its own rules too. The people of Kashmir hold dual passports - one Indian and the other Kashmiri. However, it was meant to be a *temporary* provision.

On the other hand, Article 35A empowered the J&K Legislature to define the state's permanent residents, their privileges and special rights. Due to the scrapping of these Articles, the Kashmiris have now become a part of India and thereby have to follow the Indian constitution. Henceforth, Jammu and Kashmir will be recognized as a union territory with a legislature, and Ladakh without a legislature. This complete turn of events has drastically affected the people residing in the region. There was a complete shutdown in the region while the decision was passed followed by a social-media and network isolation in the States. There was a curfew in the State and one could see military troops patrolling the area. This caused unrest in the region where the people of the State were unaware of their national status and changed citizenship. This led to Kashmiris raising their voice against the lack of opportunity to put forth views about the same. The transition is not going to be an easy one as a lot needs to be looked into. Meanwhile the State is set to be reorganized on October 31, 2019.

Whether it will be a day to celebrate or not, only time will tell. What remains pertinent is: Kashmiri voices should be heard. After all, it is their home.

## Turn The Tables with Priya Kumar

An interview with motivational speaker, business coach and the bestselling author of books like 'The Wise Man Said', and 'I'll be with you' which was recently made into a web-series 'The Final Call'.

#### Q. What was the thought process behind your latest book-'Turn the Tables' and what would be the key takeaway from the book?

"When I started my career as a motivational speaker there was no concept of start-ups. The success stories that we came across were mainly male-dominated about how their rebellious streak helped them overcome struggles. For a young woman trying to make it as a motivational speaker back in the day when that industry was practically non-existent was quite the task. The book charts my journey as a teacher, a motivational speaker, and an author. In short, the book is all about having things your way where you get to choose and call the shots. If I can do it then anyone can!"

### Q. How long does it take to make characters like Sammy from 'The Wise Man Said'? What is your process of writing a

"It takes me about five to eight days to write a book. I start with a general concept and that gives me the idea about what I am going to write. The process takes about ten days where I do not interact with anybody, and by the fourth day of being on this social recluse, I am ready to type out my thoughts. Once I start writing on day 5, it just takes me another five days to finish the book. This is how all my stories are written. And as to creating characters, well, I just get these ideas that really fascinate me. Every character that you see in my book are common people who has chosen their way of life. That gives them their own unique abilities, a way of thinking and skills too."

#### Q. How do you edit things out of the book?

"Well, my first draft is the one where I write everything I feel, and then I just leave it be. Sometimes for a few days, weeks or even a month. After this I review it, and see if the idea makes sense. This is where the editing starts. The best time to edit the book is after a period of detachment."

#### Q. Your thoughts on writer's block.

"I've written a book where I talk about writer's block. Honestly, I've never had it. But whenever I feel that I'm stuck, I just lie down or I sleep it off. So it's just the fatigue gotten in, not that you can't think, or maybe there are too many things in your head. It is better to rest it off."

#### Q. Any plans of maybe trying your hand at screenwriting given the audiences response to 'The Final Call'?

"Already doing that! Along with the screenplay of my next web series I also did the first three drafts of the 'The Final Call'. Two years ago I did a course in screenplay writing and directing from the New York Film Academy. I personally believe that the author should write the screenplay because as an author you have created the characters, lived with them and so have better knowledge of the characters than the person who takes up the book for adaptation. The small details are what inspire me to write and direct my next web series."

#### Q. How does it feel to finally see your characters come to life on screen?


"It's a great feeling to see your characters come to life and the best part as an author is when you have your books signed out for the visual medium, have it in the contract that you wish to be involved in the selection of characters and get to be the head of script, which means you know what kind of changes will be made to your script, in your story and who will be the cast. It feels great to have your story present in visual medium."

#### Q. On a daily basis what inspires you the most?

"I wake up with the sense of responsibility to deliver what I have been trusted with and this definitely gets me going. Apart from that, it could be anything: a good read, music, a post or some video or even meeting someone after a long time and seeing how far they have come. Inspiration is easily available, and I surround myself with positivity to be in good spirits in order to do more."

#### Q. What would be one life lesson that is not part of your books, which changed you as a person that you'd like to share with our readers?

"Never compromise. Don't cut your dreams short. Never think that if you compromise now, if you shut up now, or if you just put your head down today then in future opportunities will open up. That is never going to happen. You need to stand up now, stand tall now, fight for your dreams now and that is how the future is made. Anyone who tries to give you this big speech on sacrifice, compromise and living small, don't listen to that person. You live as you want to live as it is your life."

Steps to get yourself a sponsorship/mentor:


- Develop your idea and the various ways in which it can be turned into a proper business model.
